On October 8th we had a successful fall conference. We had a great turnout, and we were able to get together with our sisters and catch up with our lives. The venue was excellent, and I thank Kaye Jones and Kappa for the delicious luncheon and goodies. Kim Brown (Beta Beta) presented an excellent leadership program. We have very talented sisters within our chapters. I would like to encourage other members of OSO to share information they feel important and enhance our membership knowledge and lives. During the fall conference, we shared results from the revitalization survey. I was impressed with participation: over 30% responded. Most chapters and some state members responded. BRIEF JOB DESCRIPTIONS FOR ELECTED OFFICERS AND ELECTED COMMITTEES

STATE OFFICERS

President shall:

1. Recommend to the Executive Board a treasurer and an administrative secretary. Appoint a parliamentarian, editor of *The New Oregon Trail*, all standing committees, special committees and special personnel, District Coordinators.
2. May recommend to the Executive Board a local Convention/Conference Coordinator.
3. Serve as an ex-officio of all committees except Nominations.
4. Name an official representative for meetings if the president is unable to attend.
5. Be responsible for leadership development throughout the state.
6. Serve as chair of the Executive Committee.
7. Appoint three members of the Executive Board to review and recommend for approval the minutes of State Executive Board meetings.
8. Be responsible with the Membership Committee for orientation and initiation of honorary members.
9. Consult with the Expansion Committee and/or sponsoring chapters regarding new chapters and the candidates for membership in these chapters.
10. Secure the incoming state president's pin for presentation at the state convention.

Vice President shall:

1. Serve as general coordinator for all state conferences/conventions, district and/or combined district workshops and retreats.
2. Perform those duties assigned by the president and/or the Executive Board.
3. Serve as presiding officer in the absence of the president.

Secretary shall:

1. Be responsible for minutes of Oregon State Organization.
2. Prepare an Executive Board roster and present a quorum report of Board meetings.
3. Maintain a file of correspondence, reports, and minutes from the previous and current biennium.
4. Perform those duties assigned by the president and/or the Executive Board.



STANDING COMMITTEES

Requested from Districts 4, 5, and 6 for terms in 2023

General Description of Committees

The Finance and Nominations Committees shall consist of one member from each district elected for a term of two biennium. Nominations for members of the Finance and Nominations Committees shall be received from the districts by the district coordinators and submitted to the Nominations Committee by December 15 of even numbered years.

Election of members to the Finance and Nominations Committees shall be by ballot by members of the Executive Board from the districts of the candidate. Election shall be by a majority of the ballots cast.

A member shall serve no more than two consecutive terms on the same committee.

Comment: Committee meetings are generally held prior to major conferences and conventions, by Zoom or in person, and at state conferences and conventions in person.

Nominations Committee shall:

Be responsible for seeking qualified candidates for state offices and elective positions, preparing recommendation forms, providing information for *The New Oregon Trail*, preparing the ballots, conducting elections, and installing officers.

Comment: Continuing members from other districts are present on the committee to train and share information with new members.

Finance Committee shall:

Be responsible for supervision of the financial affairs of the state including recommendations for the expenditure and investment of funds, preparation of an annual budget for adoption by the Executive Board, and arranging for an annual financial review.

Comment: Continuing members from other districts are present on the committee to train and share information with new members. The state treasurer is present to guide and assist as needed.

OREGON LEADERSHIP POSITIONS

Helping make the Oregon State Organization run smoothly.

DISTRICT COORDINATORS:

Support chapters in their districts and function as liaisons between chapters and state president. They serve on the state convention committee.

PARLIAMENTARIAN: An expert in parliamentary procedure who sits next to the presiding officer during meetings. The parliamentarian speaks to the assembly only when requested and may provide explanations or advice, but not rulings, which are always made by the presiding officer. Training is available at International events.

ADMINISTRATIVE SECRETARY: Performs basic clerical, organizational and office responsibilities. Attends and serves as registrar for state events.

BYLAWS COMMITTEE: Reviews STATE by-laws to determine accuracy and alignment with International.

Recognizing members and those in our community who stand out for their educational work and interests.

SCHOLARSHIP/FINANCIAL AWARDS COMMITTEE:

This committee shall promote interest in and support for the scholarships. They shall review scholarship applications for accuracy and submit to appropriate level.

AWARDS COMMITTEE: Receives and reviews nominations for the various state awards and determines who will be receiving them.

Strengthening Oregon educators and education with information and training.

EDUCATIONAL EXCELLENCE COMMITTEE:

This committee shall promote programs and projects for excellence in education. The committee shall identify long-term and short-term programs and projects that focus upon topics adopted by the Society. The committee shall support programs of action that promote the personal well-being, intellectual growth, and global awareness of women educators; encourage a focus on the arts at state and international conventions and conferences. Committed to developing strategies that will enable chapters to encourage their members to become leaders, Education Excellence includes sub-committees with a strong focus:

- **INTERNATIONAL PROJECTS & WORLD FELLOWSHIP COMMITTEE:** The World Fellowship committee shall grant world fellowships, when sufficient funds are available, to women educators who are not members of Delta Kappa Gamma Society International and who live in countries other than the United States of America and Canada.
- **US FORUM / NGO / U.N. LIAISON COMMITTEE,** which supports non-partisan federal legislation in the interests of education and women educators. DKG provides U.S. members with relevant information on pending issues and legislator contact numbers to enable more effective

advocacy.

- **LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE:** Works with US Forum to monitor educational issues within the national and state legislatures. Alerts members to upcoming relevant legislative topics.
- **LEADERSHIP COMMITTEE:** Works closely with the Educational Excellence Committee to plan leadership development activity for at least one meeting per year.

Supporting the work that DKG goes and providing accompaniment for ceremonies and events.

MUSIC COMMITTEE: Facilitate and implement music at state events; e.g., Alpha Rhoes choir and accompaniment for ceremonies or prior to events while members gather.

Note: If you like the games that entertained us on Friday evening at the last convention, you could add a new group to be in charge of arranging that activity.

Keeping every member “in the know” and “in the loop” through communications: printed, digital or electronic, and on various social media platforms that attract educators and other professionals.

COMMUNICATIONS/TECHNOLOGY COMMITTEE: The purpose of this committee is to provide the linkage of member to member, Chapter to State, and State to International and to encourage communication

with constituents. Recommendations concerning publicity and printed publications shall be submitted to the Executive Board for approval. Communications/Technology committee is responsible for updating the website, linking it to State and International websites, and sending in quarterly reports for the state newsletter. The editor of The New Oregon Trail and the Webmaster both serve on this committee.

- **WEBMASTER :** Responsible for maintaining the Oregon State Organization website, making sure that it contains the information relevant to the needs of the times, and ensuring that the website is user-friendly and working properly.
- **EDITOR:** Responsible for the clarity and accuracy of content that is published or broadcast. Publish the New Oregon Trail newsletter and disburse to members four or more times a year. As needed, prepare, and edit state brochures or other documents.
- **SOCIAL MEDIA DIRECTOR:** This is a fresh focus for 2022-2023 which would improve our members' opportunities to contact younger professionals. Possible work could include: Provides information and training on use of and benefits of various social media platforms to better connect with the educators and trainers in this century! Examples might include Linked In, Instagram, Pinterest, Facebook Groups, Google Groups, and many more, including those linked to International Office, such as DKG blogs, the DKG app, and DKG groups.

Happy 100th Birthday to Helen Benscheidt, Beta Beta!



What do centenarians have in common? Positivity, a strong work ethic, close bonds with family, and ties to the countryside. That list of attributes describes Dr. Helen Benscheidt. On October 26, she will be 100 years young.

Although she faced adversity, she gets on with life. As a young, widowed, single mother, Helen went back to school to earn a teaching certificate, and she kept going until she earned a Doctorate in Education at the University of Northern Colorado, Greeley. If she sees a need, she fills it. Her niece was the impetus behind her 1969 founding of the Marie Mills Center in Tillamook, a non-profit that serves needs of the developmentally and intellectually disabled.

Helen was in Germany with her husband in 1947, immediately after World War II. One of her sons was born in Munich. When Helen remarried, she

added another son to her already existing three. Her greatest satisfaction, she says, in a life filled with accomplishments and benchmarks, is pride in the way her sons turned out. They are successful, happy, and have created their own wonderful families. Helen has ten grandchildren and several great-grandchildren – with another one on the way.

Helen Benscheidt is a Royal Rosarian, a Delta Kappa Gamma member, an Assistance League member. . . Helen is a joiner and a worker. She loves to garden, play bridge, and in the recent past, golf. In fact, she misses golf more than she misses driving. A golf cart is still parked in her garage, taking up valuable real estate, but it provides a reminder of the allure of the golf course and the beautiful outdoors.

Born in east Portland, Helen grew up in various lumber camps which her father owned and, being Helen, she learned to manage one camp. She attended Jewell High School, the University of Oregon, and claims Tillamook is her 'home town.'

A conversation with Helen is a fascinating walk down memory lane. What she has crammed into 100 years is a novel waiting to be written. "How did you learn to play golf, Helen?" "Two fellows at the Tillamook Naval Air Station taught me," she replied, and smiled. You can fit a lot of memories into 100 years!

Ms. Garrett was born in Libby, Montana, grew up in Eastern Oregon, and graduated from Marylhurst College in Lake Oswego. For 50 years, she lived and taught mathematics and PE in at Vale High School and Baker Junior and Senior High Schools, only moving in 2007 to join her sister in Beaverton, then in Eugene.

Nancy Garrett served as Alpha Rho State (OSO) president from 1981-1983. She was then elected to serve DKG International as Northwest Regional Director. Nancy could always be found helping others, as she tutored students, mentored adult leaders and served as a senior advocate in rest homes and rehabilitation centers. Nancy loved to ask questions in order to have answers, but one of her great skills was remembering peoples' names and faces and greeting everyone around her by name and with a genuine smile.

Nancy was passionate about education as a member of the Baker Education Association and of /zeta /chapter of Delta Kappa Gamma.

Nancy is remembered with fondness and appreciation by her DKG sisters.

THE FUTURE IS HERE

The future of education has arrived, and I am excited to be on the ground floor of an innovative approach to meeting every students' needs. For nearly four decades, I have been working in the field of education and the one elusive answer I could never completely find has been answered. Renowned researchers like Carol Tomlinson and Howard Gardner reported that students' learning outcomes significantly improved when teachers use differentiated content that responds to a student's learning preferences.

Until now, what has not been readily apparent is how to effectively manage a classroom with significant numbers of learning preferences and one teacher. The Modern Classroom Project, which is a research-backed instructional model, responds to every student's needs by providing blended, self-paced, mastery-based units that meet grade level standards.

As a special educator, I know the value of differentiated instruction, so when my district offered me the opportunity to participate in The Modern Classroom Project, I researched:

(1) What I found was that the project offers a free online course that prepares educators to provide instruction that fosters human connection, authentic learning, and social-emotional growth for all students!

(2) They also pair teachers with an expert mentor who teaches your content and uses the Modern Classroom model every day. The mentor provides one-on-one coaching and research-backed feedback throughout the program, which allows participants to ask questions of their mentor whenever they need support/info.
