INTERNATIONAL GUEST AND KEYNOTE SPEAKER Lyn Babb Schmid, Ed.D.

Lyn Schmid is an educator with a passion for people. She started out in her freshman year at Auburn University to be an architect, but her freshman advisor pointed out that her small, rural high school in Roanoke, Alabama, only allowed the girls to take home economics, not the requisite mechanical drawing that the boys were directed to study. That glass ceiling experience led the way for Lyn to embark upon a career in education. She agrees that develop-



ing her passion for people, rather than buildings, has been a rewarding choice.

After receiving her bachelor's degree at Auburn, Lyn earned a master's degree at Millersville University of Pennsylvania. Her Doctorate in Educational Leadership and Policy Studies was conferred at Temple University, Philadelphia, PA.

Lyn has taught secondary English, been a secondary and elementary reading specialist, a reading supervisor, and retired as an elementary principal. After 35 years of service in public education, her most recent position was serving as a National Assessment of Educational Progress assessor for the US Department of Education. In 2014-16, Lyn was the Delta Kappa Gamma Society International President; she received the International Achievement Award in 2017.

Lyn loves to watch college football and basketball. She has been widowed since 2004 and loves spending time with her friends and her two big brothers. Discussing books, movies, and women in leadership over a fabulous meal with a glass of wine is her idea of a great time.

Lyn is positive, reflective, and an enthusiastic leader. She loves humor and its power to change attitudes. 

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

Museum and Trolley Tour: Guided by the Klamath County Museum: Hop aboard for historical tours of the Klamath Falls downtown area on a trolley built to resemble the town's original streetcar that operated in the early 1900s. The Klamath County Museum has restored its replica of the streetcar.

The tours will begin at the county museum at 1451 Main Street and include a stop for refreshments at the Baldwin Hotel Museum before returning to the county museum. In 1907, George Baldwin opened the Baldwin Hotel in Klamath Falls, which he had built on a steep hillside of hard volcanic rock. Because of its location, the four-story structure was built with longer floors at higher stories, like steps. Early on, it was called the Baldwin Brick. Baldwin's daughter <u>Maud</u> had a photography studio on the fourth floor. By 1909, Baldwin had remodeled the building to make it into a hotel and restaurant.

In today's divisive atmosphere, the work provided a sense of accomplishment toward waging peace and promoting justice, which is the mission statement of Global Volunteers. Projects included remodeling houses for the homeless, filling boxes of canned goods

in food banks, preparing and serving Thanksgiving dinners, and serving refugees seeking help in the San Juan Respite Center as they connected with their sponsors and left for their new homes.

Kate Kelleher (Beta Beta) Legislative Updates at the State and National Level

(DKG/Personal/Growth) Oregon's Legislature was in short session this year. Kate will update us on what the legislature accomplished—and what was left to consider later. TREASURER'S REPORT FOR THE 2023-24 BUDGET

We have 16 chapters, and all their dues are paid. We have 320 members counting our honorary members. (Honorary members do not pay dues.)

Our budget is \$15,675 with a contingency of 10% built into the budget. Our membership dues cover only 45% of our budget. The money leftover--because it was <u>not</u> requested from last year's budget--is 18% of this year's budget. That means if we use our total budget, we will need to request money from the permanent fund to fill in the gap and we will need to reduce our operating budget for next year.

Sixty-seven members from 23 states attended the US Forum 2024 National Legislative Seminar held March 10-13 in Arlington, VA. Three members represented Oregon: Kate Kelleher, Beta Beta; Tara Heikila, Alpha Epsilon; and US Forum Steering Committee Chair Darlene Cook, Chi.

Issues and speakers featured at this year's seminar included the following: "The Role of Artificial Intelligence in Today's Classroom" (Rob Weil, AFT); mental health topics and concerns (Dr. Anita Everett, Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration); issues from the US Department of Ed (Gwen Graham); and "Social Security - The Program, Solvency and WEP/GPO" (Tom Nicholls, AARP). Advocacy Consultant Lisa Maatz opened the session, speaking on "Women and Education: Issues in the Upcoming Legislative Landscape" and Blake Kelly, AARP, discussed the "Ins and Outs of Meeting on the Hill with Members of Congress." DKG members presented table talks on "Taking

Advocacy to the Next Level," a panel on "Improving Working Conditions for Teachers," conversations on "Navigating the Healthcare System, Facts About African American Women, and Famous Women Sites in Washington, D.C.," and a creative presentation "Artful Tools - An Evening with the Arts."

MEMBERSHIP & EXPANSION Recruitment, Retention, & Revitalization Conference Session

The wrap up of our last Membership & Expansion Committee session included sharing SMART goals that each chapter has been working on to increase recruitment, retention, and revitalization. This session will be a follow-up to that meeting, will cover progress toward achieving SMART Goals, and will discuss next steps for the rest of the biennium. Daphne and Wendy will share resources from International and DKG sister states to help support chapters in this work.

The following is reprinted from the International Website with the permission of the DKG International Membership and Expansion Committee. It is being shared because inviting members to the Conference in May is the perfect opportunity to connect and bond.

ENGAGING AND RETAINING MEMBERS: THE IMPORTANCE OF BONDING

Think back to science classes and discussions on chemical bonding. We learned that a chemical bond is a lasting attraction between atoms or ions that holds them together. A lasting attraction and bonding together is something we want for all of our members. We need to do all we can to get members to have a strong relationship with one another and with the Society as a whole. Why? Because member bonding:

- Fosters a sense of belonging. For new members, it helps them feel more connected and included. We tend to retain those that feel connected.
- Nurtures strong relationships that make people feel respected, valued, heard, and seen.
 - Builds trust and a sense of community. Understanding

more about each other's backgrounds and experiences helps create an environment of inclusivity.

- Strengthens the engagement of members in chapter activities.
- Creates a more comfortable atmosphere.
- Leads to collaboration and cohesion.

We can help members create strong bonds through activities that have them getting to know each other on a more personal level. Activities such as:

- 1. Fun get-to-know you exercises (such as ice breakers).
- 2. Programs such as "Our Talented Friends" where skills and talents of members are shared or a "Nibble and Network" event where over appetizers, members teach each other about something or share information on topics of interest.
- 3. Shake-it-up seating at meetings (where members sit together based on month of birthday or favorite food or favorite movie/book genre or favorite area of the world to travel, etc.).
- 4. Rose Buddies or mentors.
- 5. Acts of appreciation (recognizing birthdays, DKG anniversaries, accomplishments, etc.).
- 6. Carpool conversations.
- 7. Community volunteering projects.
- 8. Coffee chats.
- 9. Book clubs.
- 10. Board game gatherings.
- 11. Potlucks where members share the recipe of the item they brought. (Or just a picnic!).

The importance of creating lasting relationships and connections between our members cannot be overstated. The more comfortable members feel, the more likely they are to be engaged in chapter activities. And, when members are comfortable and engaged, we are more likely to retain them.

STATEWIDE UPDATE

Dolly Parton Imagination Library Margorie Lowe, M/P Early Learning Hub Kathy Martell, DPIL Ambassador & DKG officer

A lot has happened since spring 2023 when Oregon decided to go statewide with the Dolly Parton Imagination Library Program (DPIL). On February 15, 2024, via



On February 15, 2024, via Zoom, the leaders of the affiliates of DPIL programs already established in Oregon, met with three top DPIL representatives: Nora Briggs, Executive Director; Rachel King, National Regional Representative; and Pam Hunsaker, Senior Advisor. Here are some key points discussed in the Zoom meeting.

- The Oregon Statewide Program has been approved by the Dollywood Foundation and by Oregon Governor's Office, with the Dollywood Foundation being the designated 501(c)(3). That means the 50% matching funds from the state will go directly to the Dollywood Foundation and local affiliates will pay only their 50% matching funds for the month. What a savings for local affiliates! Right now, the Marion and Polk Early Learning Hub affiliate (covering most of Marion and Polk Counties) has a monthly bill of over \$10,000 since we have 5,180 children enrolled. Our monthly bill will be reduced by half when the state participation goes into effect in April after the license agreement and contract are finalized.
- Oregon's Governor's Office has committed to DPIL being a long-term program and to supporting legislation in the next session to authorize making it a statutory program.
- The state will convene a DPIL statewide advisory committee with the Rippey family (the family that funded 33 affiliates in small communities outside the Willamette Valley) being the only named member at this point.
- Oregon has an estimated 224,000 eligible children who could be in the program with over 52,000 (23%) participating now—192,000 kids to go.
- The state plans to flag ODE student records related to Imagination Library participation to allow for tracking of student outcomes.
- Only two books an age level are bilingual (Spanish/ English). Eventually, the option for parents to register to receive every book as bilingual will be expanded to Oregon. California is testing that out now.
- Book prices are not expected to increase soon; current

increases are mostly driven by mailing costs.

• The state agency role for the Department of Early Learning and Care (DELC) will be to establish partnerships with statewide initiatives like birthing hospitals or birth certificate start points, state foster care placements, and parent/child participation for incarcerated parents. In other states, such programs are funded with the other 50% match coming from the partner state agency such as a child welfare agency or corrections department.

Dolly Parton will come to Oregon for a celebration once every Oregon zip code is included in the program.
