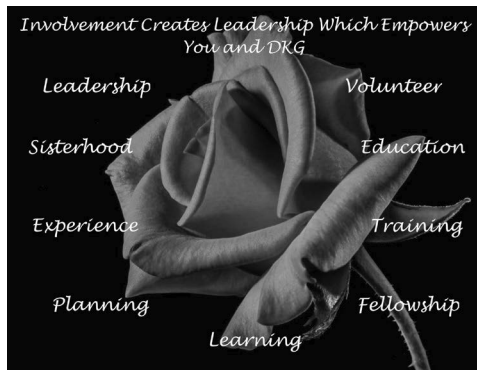
The dates are April 28 (check in) through April 30 (check out).

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JOIN THE GALA ART EVENT: THE ARTSY TRIFECTA

A fun project, resulting in a gala art event is being planned for our OSO/ DKG Spring Convention.

Introducing the “**Artsy Trifecta**”: This first communication is an invitation for our DKG artists and friends . . . We are looking for volunteer artists to add their creative touches via paintings or mixed media collages. It doesn’t matter if you are a shy hobbyist or a professional artist, everyone can participate.

This collaborative art project will involve three different artists working on separate thirds of one canvas that will be passed around the state. They will not see what the other collaborators have done and will not know who they were teamed with until the unveiling event on Friday, April 28, at convention.

1. The **first** artist will start at the top with a “head.” When finished, that section will be covered with only two inches showing for the second artist to see. With our committee’s help, each canvas will be passed on to the next artist.
2. The **second** artist will add the “torso” to our imaginary character. Likewise, when the second section is painted, it will all be covered again, except for the lower two inches for the third artist to see.
3. The **third** artist will finish the canvas with a representation of the “feet.’

The “head, torso and feet” are vague suggestions. Your artwork can represent a human, animal, botanical, robot, or an imaginary figure! We are encouraging experimentation. As artists, you will be creating and probing the nature of collaboration, partnership, and unfettered artistic genius! It is meant to be fun!

You may have done this activity with your students or may remember doing this as a child on folded paper. There is a history about this process: In 1925, Surrealist artists in Paris played the game Exquisite Corpse to stimulate creativity through collaboration. Players would contribute to a drawing of a figure without seeing what the others had done. Like a game of Telephone where words got jumbled, the images became stranger and more imaginative with each player’s addition.

US FORUM IDENTIFIES ISSUES

The purpose of the US Forum is to address significant issues affecting women, children, and education upon which our US DKG members may take action. During the 2022-2024 biennium, the primary focus of the Forum is the mental health resolution: **Recognizing Mental Health Issues for Educational Staff and Providing Support Services.** This resolution was initiated by the Washington State Organization and was adopted at the US Forum Session at the 2022 International Conference in New Orleans.

The key components addressed in the resolution are:

1. **To educate members on the issues and needs related to mental health for educational staff** through study, workshops, and other avenues
2. **To inform members of current legislation related to mental health services for educators** so that they may take appropriate actions including to initiate, endorse and support desirable legislation
3. **To promote de-stigmatization of mental illness** through dissemination of information on successful school-based treatment programs, supports and other resources
4. **To engage in a wide range of activities that demonstrate emotional support** for educators

Other issues for the biennium were determined by a survey sent to our US members last fall. 2754 members from all four US regions completed the on-line survey. Rising to the top of member concerns were the following:

- Safety from Gun Violence in Schools and Communities
- Poverty/Homelessness/Food Insecurity
- Working Conditions/Recruitment and Retention of Staff
- Censorship of Speech/Material/Books
- Bullying and Cyberbullying
- Social Media and Its Impacts on Mental Health

The mission of the US Forum is to serve the interests and concerns of its members through sharing ideas and exploring solutions to the specific issues identified by its members. All members residing in the United States are members of the US Forum. **Take action and get involved!** Make plans to join upcoming Forum webinars and a Forum Session at one of the International Conferences this summer! Save the date and attend the National Legislative Seminar in Washington, DC, area March 10-13, 2024!

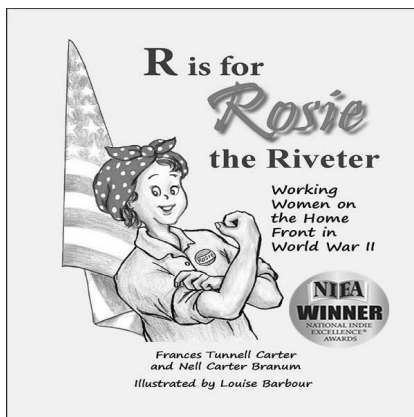

ARF GRANT SUPPORTS LITERACY & HISTORY PROJECT

The Pilcrow Foundation, run by Dr. Karren Timmermans, Lambda Co-President, will use the funds to purchase hardcover copies of *R is for Rosie*. The Rosies, who supported the World War II effort, are aging, and it is important for their legacy and work to be a part of children's literacy. Who did industrial jobs when the men were at war around the world? Women did. Long before "STEM" became part of educational jargon, thousands of able women work in skilled positions in construction and welding and, of course, riveting. Known as "Rosie the Riveters," these women were vital to the war effort.



These books will be 'bonus' books for the rural public libraries and become a part of each library's permanent collection. Each book will have a bookplate and include a line acknowledging the Alpha Rho Foundation.

As Dr. Timmermanns wrote: "I am requesting \$1,000. At the retail price, this will allow me to purchase 50 books to send to libraries across the country. I will contact the publisher for a bulk purchase discount. If a discount is offered, I will purchase up to \$1,000 worth of books. In my report to ARF upon conclusion of the grant, I will include details about libraries that received the books and how many were distributed. I expect the project this grant will fund to conclude by June 2023."

CHI MEMBER HEADED TO FINLAND!

The final 2022 scholarship was awarded to **Jo Strom Lane**,



Chi, for her planned attendance at the International Conference in Tampere, Finland, this July. She received \$2,500 from the Personal En-

richment Commemorative Fund. Jo teaches theater arts at Roosevelt High School in Portland and has been an active member of Chi Chapter since 2017. In 2001, she organized some of her high school students to provide entertainment for the International Conference in Portland. She continues to take an active role in programs and leadership in Chi Chapter.

Jo explained clearly what she hopes to gain from this trip: “The Finnish school system is one of the most revered in the world. I’ve longed to travel to Finland for decades, visit at least one school, and absorb knowledge about the approach to education that has transformed the country and impacted the world. I have so many questions to ask!

- In what ways has Finland invested in education unprecedented in other countries?
- How has the framework impacted other facets of Finnish life?
- What lessons have been learned?
- What unintended consequences have surfaced in the years of implementation?
- How have the arts, in particular theatre, played a role in this transformation?”

She pointed out, “This DKG conference takes place in one of the incredible cultural gems of Finland, the city

of Tampere. I can’t imagine a better opportunity to learn about, experience, and immerse myself in educational change than in Finland, and this conference provides the perfect opportunity. To witness the scale in which Finland created an intentional educational revolution would be remarkable and I would savor every moment.” Jo has “. . . already made contact with several individuals who live and work in Finland, so that I might secure additional time outside of the conference to meet with educators in the area both in an urban setting (Tampere) and rural setting (Esse).”

How will Jo use this experience? “It is my hope that what I learn will empower me, and I can apply this knowledge within my school district where I sit on the Curriculum Adoption Committee, Master of Arts Education Planning Committee, and work with both school and district levels, hoping to influence change for the benefit of students. And, of course, I plan to use my new knowledge in my own theatre arts classroom!”

At the January 9, 2023, meeting, the Beta Beta Educational Foundation announced recipients of the Margaret Nielsen Financial awards:

OMEGA LEARNS ABOUT LOCAL FOUNDATION

The Redwood Foundation for Education (RFE) provides scholarships and grants to students in schools throughout Southern Oregon. Awards are based on demonstrated leadership, co-curricular activities, academics, and need. They are funded by donations from individuals, businesses, service clubs, and school alumni. Students from Josephine, Jackson, and Douglas Counties are within the service area. Omega members were interested in what services are provided to students and what area was served.



Sylvia Marr (photo above), RFE administrative assistant from Grants Pass, presented to Omega at our Nov. 15, meeting. Founded in 1964 as the "Josephine County Educational Fund, Inc. (JCEF)," after more than five decades of growth, JCEF changed its name this year to better recognize its expanded service area and scope. Today, the newly named Redwood Foundation for Education manages 250 individual funds and more than \$8 million in assets. In

2020, they awarded \$574,050 in scholarships, \$86,000 in grants and invested \$37,000 in projects throughout Josephine County and Southern Oregon.

encouragement, some financial support, and spiritual encouragement for those interested.

February we meet in person again, with a program about *Scams, Identity Theft, and Fraud*. Steven Chambers from the Eugene Police Department's Community Engagement Team will speak. He will give us direction on how to prevent being victims of these crimes. Residents of Camelot Village (where we will meet) will be invited to join us for this program.

Sigma (Bend, Redmond, Central Oregon): In December, Sigma members activated their creative side. Laurie Sensibaugh brought a variety of rocks. Members selected their favorite size and shape, then added holiday-oriented designs.

Alpha Epsilon (Salem area): November was fun! We met at Salem for Refugees to tour their new facility, meet new staff, and hear a presentation on how this group coordinates with others to help the official (government-determined) refugees who

are assigned to this area. In case you are unaware, Salem has a large Slavic population, so many fleeing the chaos in Ukraine find sponsors and friends here. Our chapter is deciding the level of support and participation we can provide to our newest residents.

Research has shown that reading to a child while holding the child on the parent's chest will help to make up for not hearing the parent's voice during the last trimester before birth—and it also assists with parent-child bonding.

Chapter members are also donating books to the third-grade class of an early-career educator at Yoshikai Elementary. Our first contributions were gathered at the Christmas dinner. Our goal is 70 books suitable for a variety of reading levels within the third-grade class. The new literacy project is in honor of Mary Lynn Morgan, a former member who died last summer at age 70.

District 5

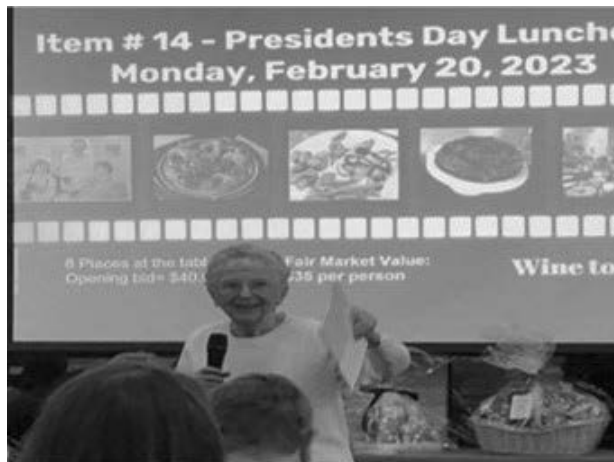
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Beta Beta (Tigard/Tualatin/Sherwood):
